INTRODUCTION

The Barking and Dagenham Safeguarding Children Partnership exists to safeguard and promote the welfare of all children in the Borough, and is committed to the development, co-ordination, monitoring and review of safeguarding practices and ensuring that effective child protection procedures within and between all agencies working with children and young people are in place.

WHO RUNS THE COURSES?

The BDSCP provides the training courses presented in this directory. Some of the training is delivered by locally based people who have particular knowledge and experience in various aspects of safeguarding and some of the courses are commissioned from specialist trainers and organisations from outside the local agencies. This combination provides good inter-agency and inter-professional working locally, and benefits from best practice and research from further afield.

WHO CAN ATTEND COURSES?

Audiences for safeguarding training are diverse and include the whole of the children's and young people's workforce, including paid staff and volunteers working in the statutory, voluntary, community and independent sectors and the wider multi-agency partnership. Each individual course outlines detail who the course is aimed at. Courses are written in accordance with policies and procedures that are local to The London Borough of Barking and Dagenham and as such are only suitable to those that are working within the borough and supporting our residents.

CHOOSING A COURSE & GAINING APPROVAL TO ATTEND

To ensure the course is right for you please read the course details before you request a place and discuss with your line manager to seek approval to attend. It is your responsibility to gain approval from your line manager to attend and to make them aware of potential costs involved for cancellation of place, non attendance, or charges for agencies who do not contribute financially to the BDSCP. CANCELLATION & NON-ATTENDANCE POLICY

The demand for training and the costs involved in producing training is high and there are more and more organisations accessing the training we offer. The increased demand does mean we need to reduce the instances where people do not attend training and have not cancelled in ample time to allow others the opportunity to take their place. There is a zero-tolerance policy when it comes to non-attendance.

QUALITY ASSURANCE & EVALUATION

Quality Assurance Framework has been put in place to monitor the quality of the training events that are delivered as part of our programme.

The BDSCP has quality assurance mechanisms in place to help capture evidence of the impact of its training and learning offer.

- Attendance at wider safeguarding partnership learning events.
- Training Standards and Individual Training Agreements also help set standards by providing clear expectations for internal and external trainers.





Designated Safeguarding Lead Certificate training (2 days)

Aim

To familiarise participants with the role and responsibilities of the designated safeguarding lead for children in school or further education college and develop competence and confidence in carrying out this role.

DSL Refresher

Aim

This session is a one-day refresher training session in the area of Child Protection and the role of school Child Protection lead. It is a requirement for Designated Child Protection Leads to undertake DSL training specific to the role a minimum of every 2 years specific to the role.

- Revisit and describe the role and main responsibilities of the Designated Safeguarding Lead
- Review any recent changes to key legislation and guidance relating the education services response to safeguarding
- Key prioritises for safeguarding children in school settings and useful tools.

- Identify the blocks to staff reporting concerns and explore strategies for overcoming them
- Review a Serious Case Review, the learning and how to apply to practice.
- Managing allegations against staff and volunteers within the school setting.
